MORNING

7 A. M.

PARADE. The 86th Division, including approximately 40,000 men, will parade from Camp Grant to Rockford and return, finishing at the Camp between 11 a. m. and noon. The parade will be reviewed in Rockford by Major General Chas. H. Martin, staff and distinguished guests.

AFTERNOON

1:30 P. M.

BRONCHO BUSTING—Exhibition (Free) at Five Points, opposite Division Headquarters, Camp Grant.

2 P. M.

BASEBALL—Camp Grant vs. Fort Dodge (Free) Game will be played at Five Points parade ground, Camp Grant, immediately East of Division Headquarters marked by Division staff.

4 P. M.

BOXING—And dedication of the mammoth open-air arena, Camp Grant, seating 10,000 and overlooked by a hill upon which 20,000 soldiers will be grouped. Canadian Champion Boxers from First Depot Battalion, Carlinton Heights, London, Ontario, vs. Camp Grant. 7 bouts to a decision at the following weights: 115—125—135—145—158—175 and Heavyweight. Reserved seats on sale at popular prices (\$5, \$3 and \$2) at the headquarters of the Civilian Committee of the Overseas Athletic Fund, Suite 1021 Woman's Temple Building, 108 South La Salle Street, Chicago. Mail orders filled. Make checks payable to Oscar G. Foreman, Treasurer. Tickets unsold prior to July 4th will be on sale that date at the entrance to the boxing arena, Camp Grant. The proceeds from the boxing event will go to the Overseas Athletic Fund of the 86th Division. Arena one block south of base hospital group and two blocks west of Kiswaukee Road, main thoroughfare into Camp.

6 P. M.

ILLINOIS CENTENNIAL PAGEANT—(Free) on the hillside near the boxing arena. 700 children of Rockford participating.

9 P. M.

FIREWORKS—(Free) Greatest display of fireworks and military aerial activities ever staged in Illinois. Display will be centered at Five Points, in the heart of the Camp where it can be viewed comfortably by 100,000 people. The skies of Illinois will be a riot of color and splendor. Celebration of July 4th in this manner is in strict accordance with President Wilson's approval of 4th of July celebrations.

MUSIC—Continuous.

Ample arrangements under military police will be made for parking automobiles.

Soldiers Free to Entertain Visitors

Under the express direction of the Commanding General, all deserving men of the 86th Division will be at liberty after the parade to spend the afternoon and evening with the folks from home. Visitors are urged to visit the trench area, rifle range, Y. M. C. A. huts, K. of C. huts, bake shops and other points of interest in the Camp.

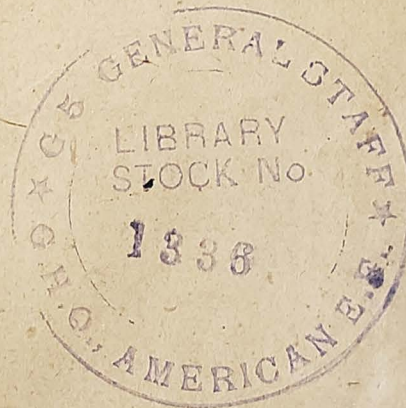

INFORMATION FOR TROOPS

U. S. S. WILHELMINA

Your Bunk No. is 248	In Troop Compartment No 2	Abandon Ship Boat	Raft 3
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DECKS

The main troop deck is divided into four compartments, numbered 1, 2, 3 and 4 from forward. Troop Compartment No. 5 is the forward one on the next deck below, and Troop Compartment No. 6 is the Messroom. (See blue print plans on bulletin boards in all troop compartments.)

Odd numbered bunks are on starboard side and even numbered on port side, the lowest numbers beginning out-board and forward, in each Compartment, and running aft consecutively.

Water-tight doors between Troop Compartments will be kept closed at all times at Sea allowing no communication between these compartments.

FOOD SERVICE

All troops take their meals in Troop Messroom (Compt. No. 6.) Those in Compartments 1, 2 and 5 go up through companion ladders to 1st. deck and into messroom through port door. (right hand door as you go in.) Get food at serving out place, just inside door, pass on to the starboard side of room where it is eaten and out through starboard door (right hand going out,) washing mess kit in trough near door.

Those troops in Compartment No. 3 go up starboard ladder to 1st. deck and pass into messroom through starboard door (right hand going in) get food, pass to port side of room, thence out by wash troughs, through port door [right hand going out] and down port ladders.

Those troops in Compt. No. 4 go up starboard ladders in No. 4 Hatch to "A" deck, thence forward on starboard side, into passageway and down stairs to Troops messroom, get food, pass to port side of room, thence out by wash troughs and up stairway to "A" deck, thence, aft and down No. 4 Hatch Those Troops berthed on "A" deck, Aft, go forward on starboard side, into passageway, down stairs, through messroom, thence up stairs, out port passageway; and aft to berths again on "A" deck.

WASHROOMS AND TOILETS

Washrooms and toilets for troops occupying Compartments 1, 2, 5 and 6 are located on 1st. deck opposite No. 1 Hatch. For troops in Compartment 3 they are located on 1st. deck, just abaft troop officers' quarters, on starboard side, and for troops in Compartment 4, and those aft on "A" deck, they are located on port side of 1st. deck, just abaft galley.

Do not throw rubbish of any kind into toilet or wash troughs. This includes tobacco bags and heavy paper.

EMERGENCY DRILLS

At all emergency drills, troops will proceed quickly, but quietly and in an orderly manner, to their abandon ship stations and await orders. They should stand well outboard so as to leave a clear passageway in-board. At "abandon ship" troops leave the ship first, except such navy crews as are necessary to man boats and rafts. The order to embark will be bugle call No. 56, "Away all boats." Boats leave first, then rafts are launched.

When the general alarm is sounded men assigned to life boats and rafts will fall in abreast of their respective boats or rafts, but on the next deck below ("A" deck for all but rafts 1 to 8 inclusive who will fall in on forward well deck.)

GENERAL

Do not spit on the deck, use the spittoons. Your assistance in keeping the ship clean will be appreciated. Only salt water will be used for bathing and washing purposes by officers and men, while at sea.

Salt water soap and other articles may be purchased from ship's store (Canteen.) Price list on bulletin board. Canteen located down No. 4 hatch, open 9.30 to 11.00 A. M. and 2 to 4.30 P. M.

Wash your face and hands in basins in the washrooms. Do not remove basins from the washrooms.

Before disembarking make your life preserver fast to your bunk, as others will want it after you have left the ship.

The use of tobacco, either smoking or chewing, is prohibited at all times in the berthing spaces.

It is forbidden to throw anything overboard in the day time. All rubbish will be put in the rubbish cans placed about the ship.

All wooden boxes and other articles that will float will be sent to the fire room and burnt. Metal boxes and cans will be punched with holes and thrown overboard at night with the garbage. Do not place anything in the garbage cans that will float.

SMOKING

Smoking is not allowed in washrooms or water closets at any time

Smoking is allowed on open deck at all times smoking lamp is lighted.

Matches are not allowed. Smoking lamps are provided on deck instead of matches.

RECREATION

Troops may use the following spaces for recreation: - "1st." deck forward of messroom both sides, to those in Compartments 1, 2, 5 and 6. "A" DECK, both sides, from No. 2 Hatch to sign, to those in Compartments 3, 4 and "A" deck, Aft, except the spaces on both sides from No. 2 to No. 4 hatches will be kept clear of troops from 8.30 to 9.30 A. M.

Troops must not enter the officers' quarters except on duty. Troops are forbidden to enter the following places at all times except when on duty:
1. All holds, cargo spaces and crew's quarters, forward and aft. 2. All decks above "A" deck. 3. Engine and fire rooms. 4. Steering engine room. 5. Galley.

In case of abandon ship, remember there is lots of time and every man must wait for orders after arriving at his abandon ship station. Do not crowd or rush. To do so will cause confusion and possible loss of life. Consult bulletin boards for your ABANDON SHIP STATION. In bunks, life belts may be used as pillows.

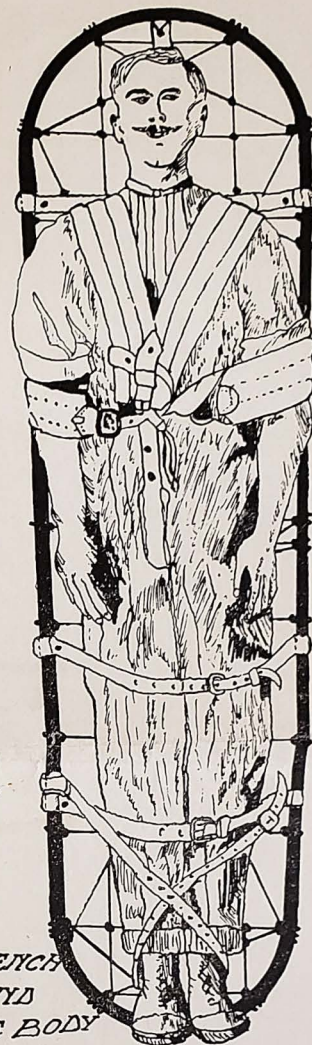
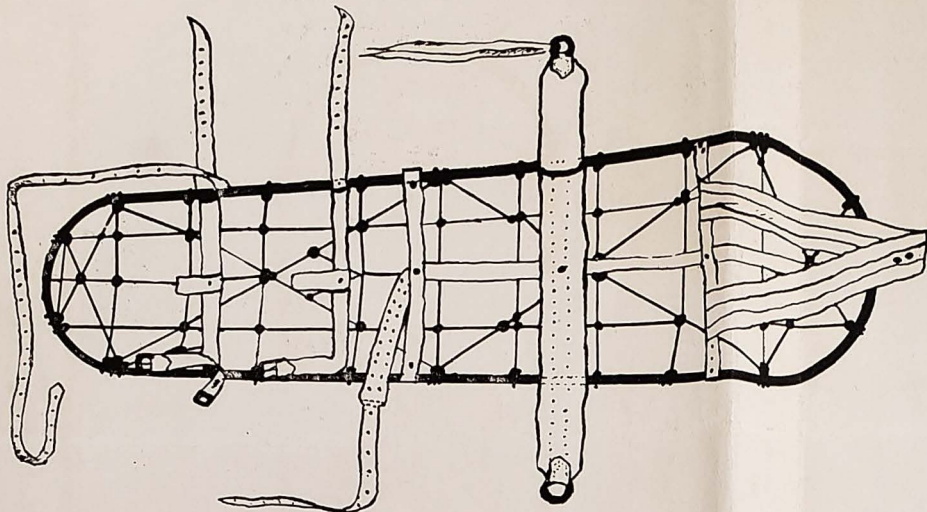

TRENCH LITTER

ADOPTED BY U.S. ARMY MED. CORPS.

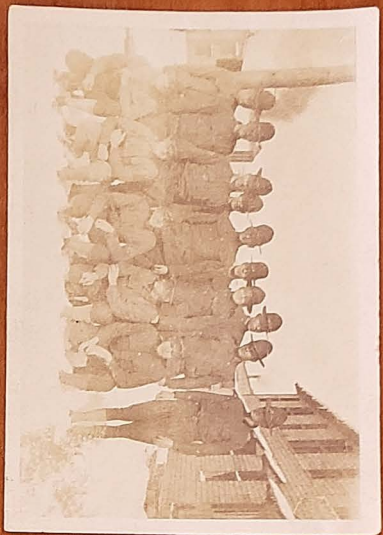


VARIOUS USES OF THE "TRENCH" OR "SNOW SHOE LITTER"

1. THE OBJECT IN DEVISING THE "SNOW SHOE LITTER" WAS FOR THE PURPOSE OF GETTING WOUNDED MEN OUT OF THE TRENCHES THAT ARE TOO NARROW OR WINDING TO PERMIT THE USE OF LITTERS OF THE ORDINARY TYPE.
2. BY FASTENING THE WOUNDED MAN SECURELY TO THE LITTER BY THE STRAPS ATTACHED HE CAN BE CARRIED THRU VERY NARROW TRENCHES, BY TURNING THE LITTER SIDEWAYS OR UPENDING IT, HE CAN BE CARRIED AROUND A TRAVERSE OR SHARP BEND IN THE TRENCHES.
3. IT PROVIDES ABSOLUTE IMMOBILIZATION OF THE PATIENT ON THE LITTER AND THUS MINIMIZES SHOCK IN FRACTURE CASES IN THE CARRY THRU THE TRENCH.
4. WHILE A LITTER, IT IS ALSO A SPLINT AND TRACTION AND COUNTER EXTENSION BE APPLIED TO ANY FRACTURE OF THE BODY.
5. IN FRACTURES OF THE SPINE, PUT ON FIRM HEAD BANDAGE WITH TAILS OF BANDAGE EXTENDING FROM BEHIND EACH EAR AND TIED TO TOP OF LITTER HOLDING HEAD AND NECK RIGID.
6. FRACTURES OF ARM AND FOREARM. PUT UP FRACTURED ARM IN WIRE GAUZE OR THIN BOARD SPLINT. LOOP BANDAGE UNDER ARM PIT AND TIE TO UPPER END OF LITTER. LOOP BANDAGE AROUND WRIST AND TIE TO SIDE OF LITTER BELOW HAND AND TWIST BANDAGE FOR TRACTION.
7. THIGH AND LEG. PUT UP FRACTURED LIMB IN WIRE GAUZE OR BOARD SPLINT. CROTCH STRAP GIVES COUNTER EXTENSION. TRACTION PROVIDED BY BANDAGE S. LOOPED ABOUT ANKLE, TIED TO END OF LITTER AND TWISTED FOR TRACTION.
8. WHEN FRACTURE CASE HAS BEEN CARRIED TO AID STATION WHERE AN AMBULANCE IS AVAILABLE HE CAN BE REMOVED FROM THE SNOW SHOE LITTER AND PUT UP IN A THOMAS OR OTHER SPLINT.
9. WHEN THE FRENCH WHEELED LITTER IS USED TWO PATIENTS CAN BE CARRIED BY SWINGING TWO SNOW SHOE LITTERS ON IT.
10. IF LOADED INTO AN AMBULANCE THE SNOW SHOE LITTER SHOULD BE PLACED ON A U.S. ARMY LITTER.

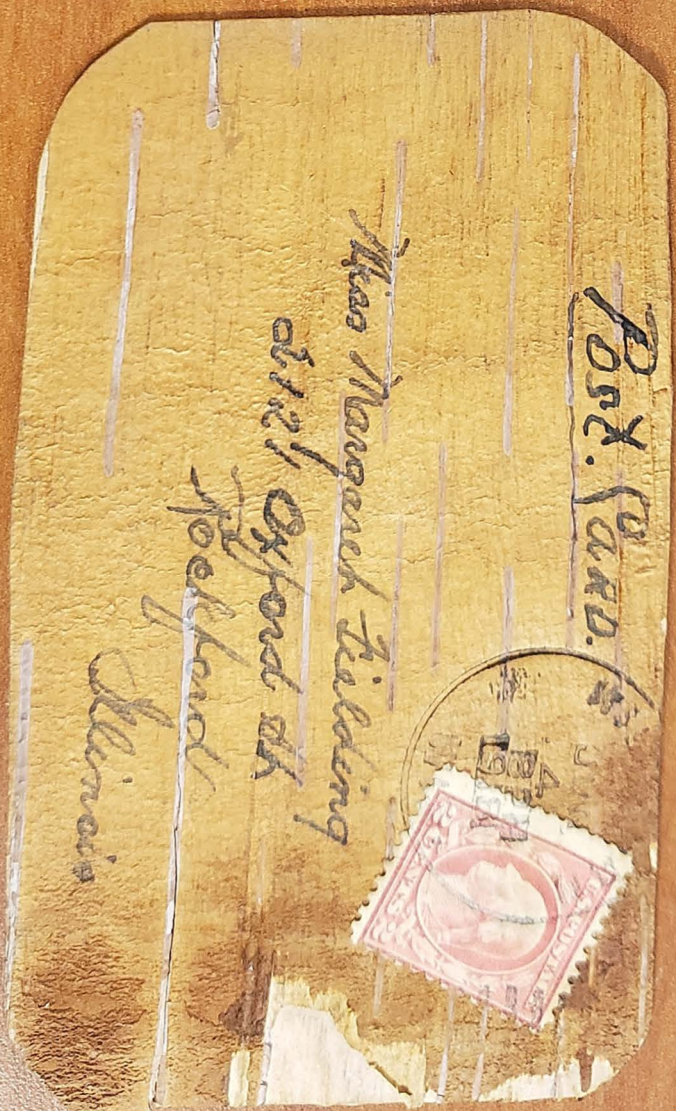

Par. 5. Pursuant to telegraphic instructions GHQ AEF, dated 19th Dec., 1918, the 311th Sanitary Train now stationed at Joinville (Haute Marne), consisting of 14 officers and 72 men, will proceed at once by rail to Bordeaux, Dept. Gironde, reporting upon arrival to the Commanding Officer that station for embarkation for the United States on the first available transport.

The Commanding Officer will communicate by wire direct with the Commanding Officer at their destination, giving their date of departure, destination and probable time of arrival.

The Quartermaster will furnish four days' travel rations and four days' liquid coffee money.

The travel directed is necessary in the military service.
